

Background

- Implement common outcome evaluation tool in 9 camps in California in Summer 2016
- Goals of the evaluation
 - Common tool across camps
 - Some overlap with other 4-H programming
 - Formal evaluation process for camps
- Evaluation contents
 - Campers
 - 4 outcome scales
 - 2 open-ended questions: 1) best part of camp and 2) what they would change
 - Teen Staff
 - 2 outcome scales
 - 4 open-ended questions
- Winter 2017: Data party!

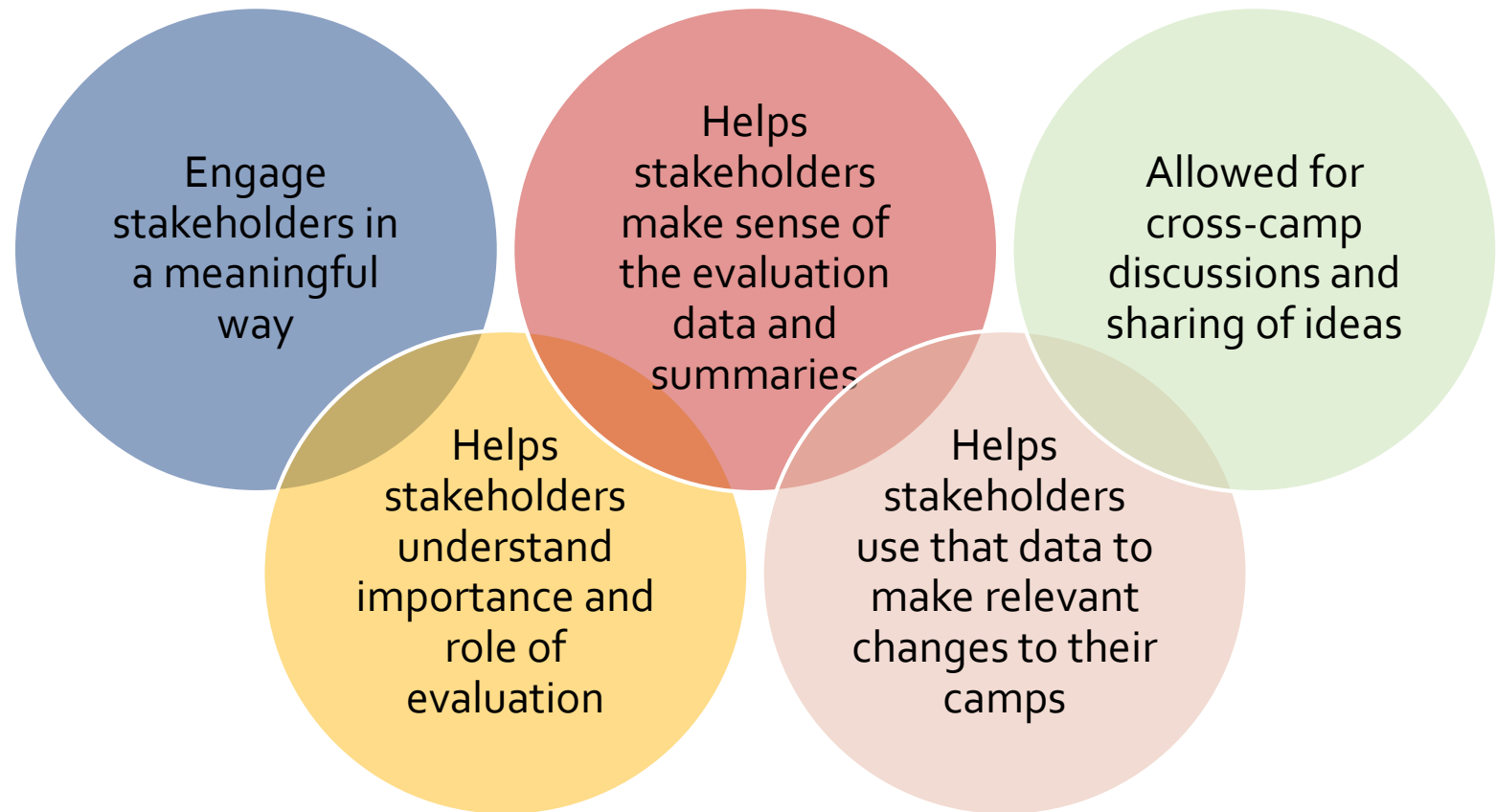

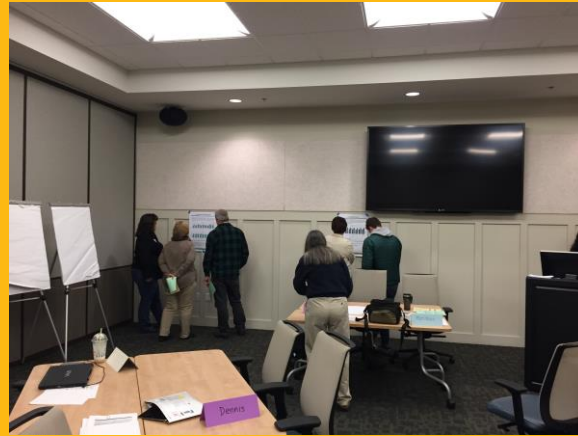

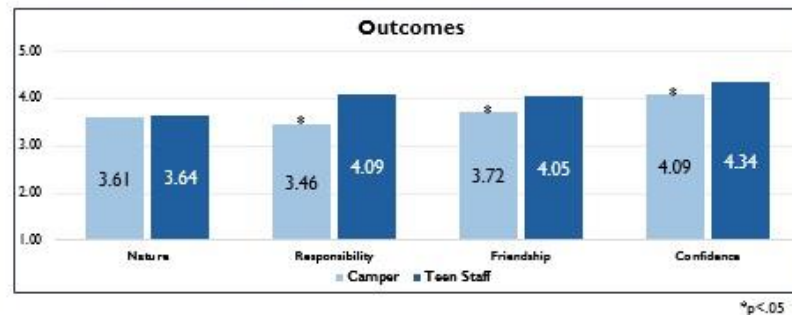


OUTCOMES

We asked a total of 30 questions about 4 outcomes:

- Affinity for Nature
- Responsibility
- Friendship Skills
- Confidence

We tested for differences in scores between Campers and Teen Staff, and found that **Teen Staff** scores were significantly higher than Campers on 3 outcomes: **Responsibility**, **Friendship**, and **Confidence**.

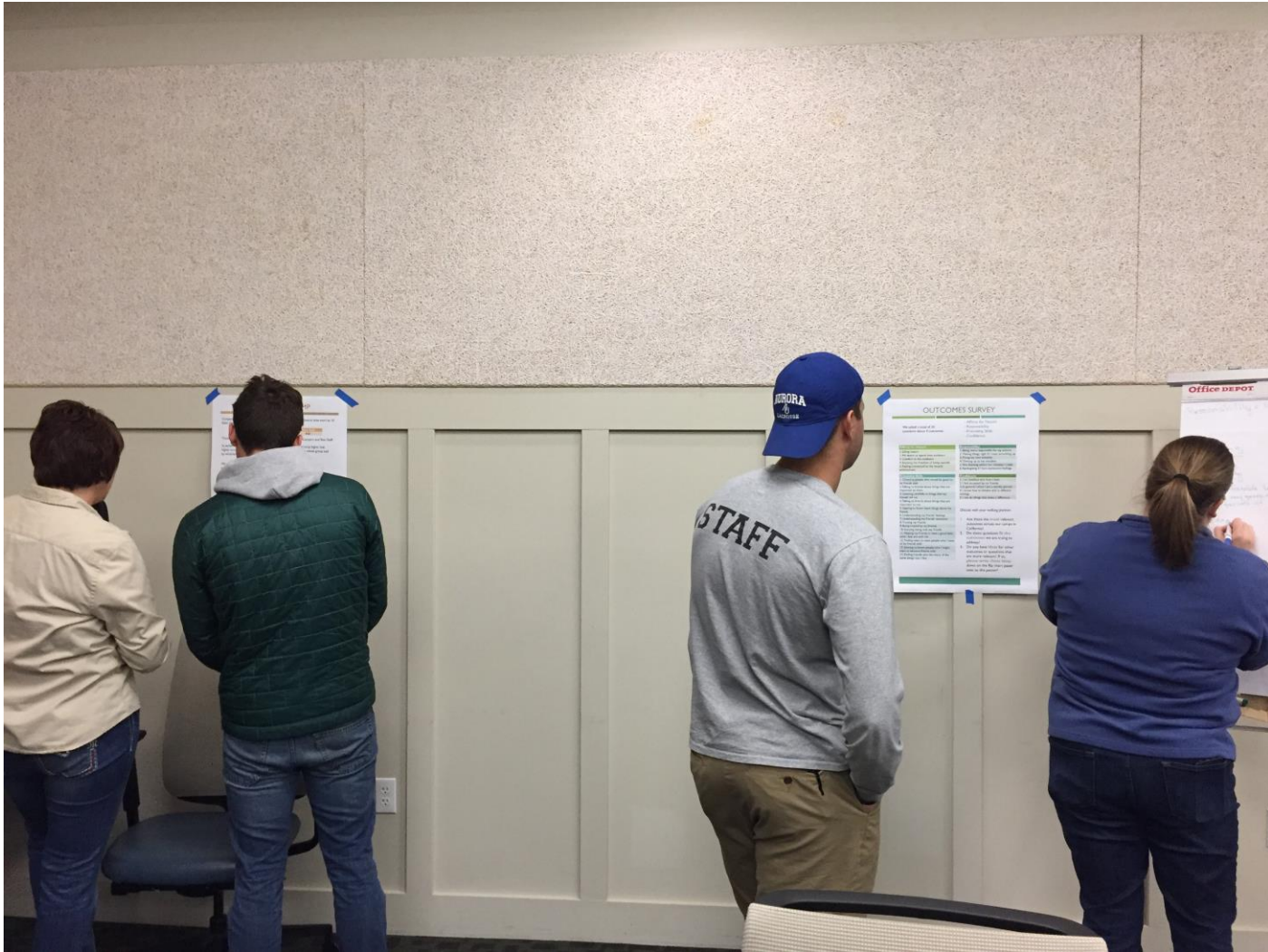
1. Do any of these findings surprise you?
2. Why might teens have higher outcomes than campers for **responsibility**, **friendship**, and **confidence**? Why not for **affinity for nature**?



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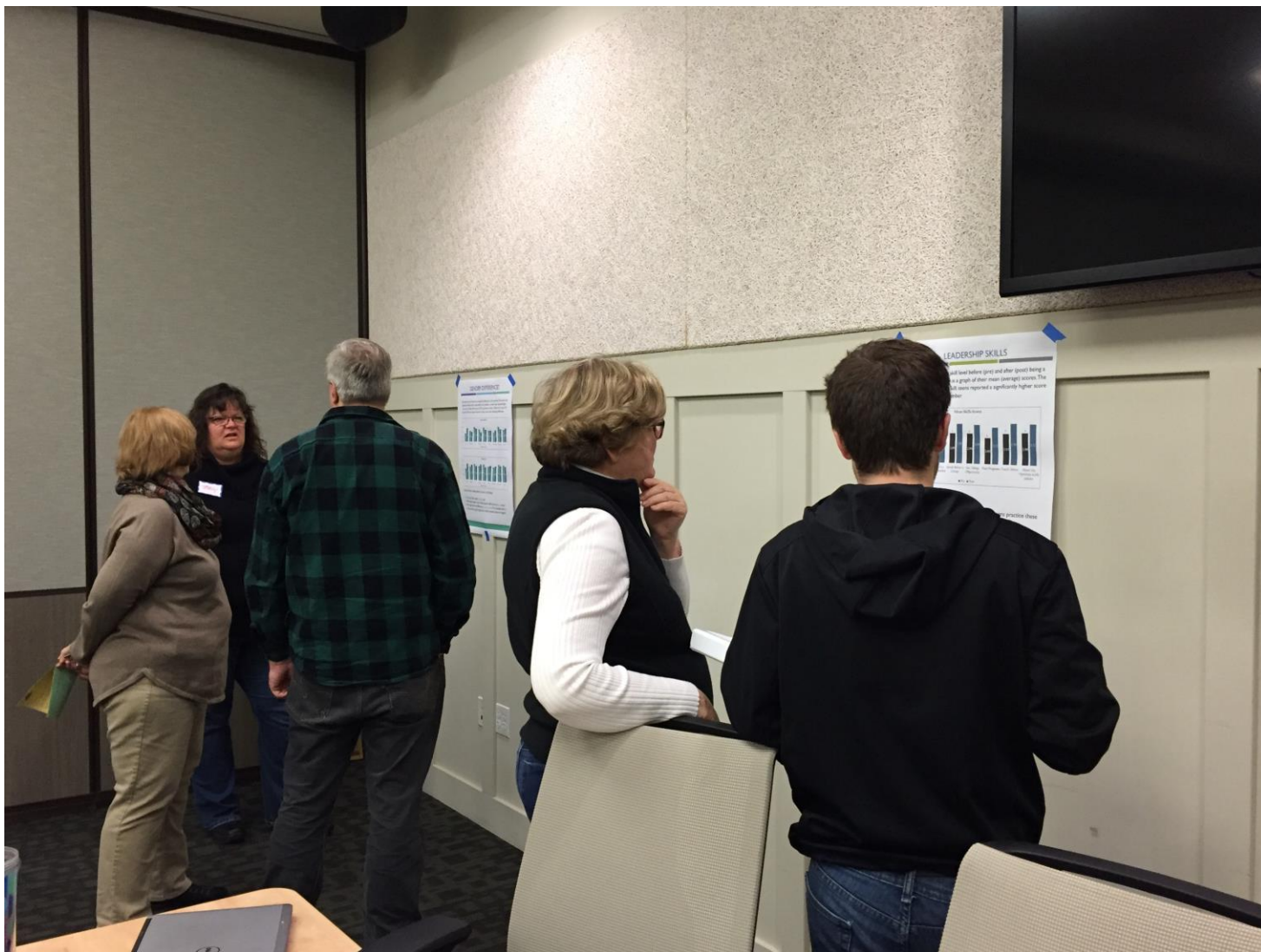

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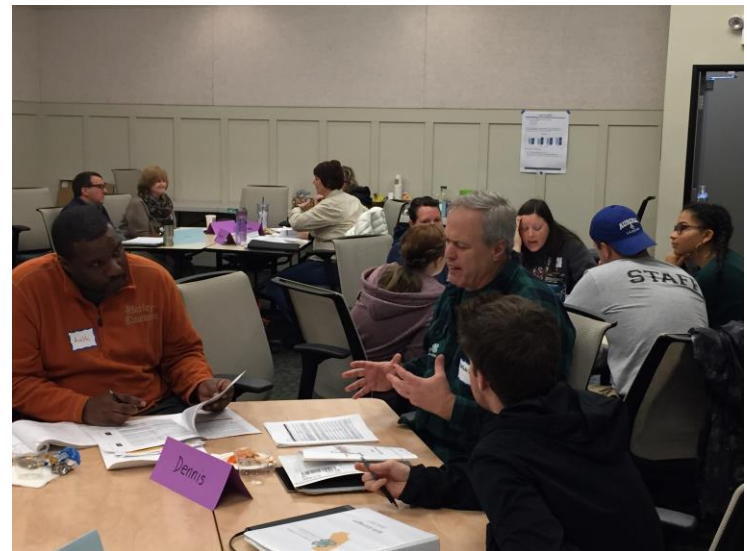
