


South Phoenix

Diabetes/Hospitalization Rate by Race/Ethnicity, 2004 (per 100,000 Census Population)






Overarching Research Question



Applying Sociocultural Theory to program development


- History

Methods

- Community Advisory Committee (4 members from target community)
- 7 focus Groups with parents/guardians
- 3 focus groups with professionals who work with families in South Phoenix
- 8 interviews with community leaders in South Phoenix
- 83 participants in total
- Validity Focus Group



Sociocultural Theoretical Implications for Evaluators

- Evaluations should consider the mutual constitution of situations at all times
- Evaluations should address the multifaceted nature of human beings
