

instead of "evaluation" try "eval\*"


The longer you wait, the more filled in or clear your letters will be

Originally had EVAL\* as the amaztype search – clipped only the relevant four letters and left the asterisk





I can't work well without Snaglt – there are LOTS of screen grabbing tools out there, but in terms of ease of use and breadth of options for annotating and formatting the item grabbed, I haven't found anything that compares. In terms of making professional looking reports, whether in a word processor, slidedeck, or online, and integrating pieces from multiple sources so that they have a common look and feel, Snaglt has paid for itself multiple times in my work.




**What am I looking at?** This is a wordcloud of the text from the AEA <u>Guiding</u>

**How was the graphic made?** The wordcloud was made using <u>Tagxedo</u>, a free online clouding tool. The text was taken from the AEA <u>Guiding Principles for Evaluators</u>. It took approximately 5 minutes to make the initial cloud and another half hour work through the many options to customize the shape, color, word sizing, and font to the ones you see. Here are the setting details:






Tool: Color Palette Generator



Tool: fiverr

Use: Hire people to do projects for \$5

Cost: \$5

People post jobs to fiverr that they are willing to do for \$5. Most of them are garbage, but there are a surprising number that are a great deal and can help with reporting. For instance, I've used them to convert a logo from a jpg to vector art (thus making the logo scalable and clean when integrating into a report), for creating an intro to a video (this cost \$10 because I wanted it in HD, but was worth every penny), and for fixing the sound on a recording. These might be a good option for a business card design, photoshopping a picture, or doing a bit of background research.

## Hints:

Look carefully at feedback and examples – when you view the profile for a job, look at the number of positive reviews and the work samples

- Consider only contracting with those who have multiple positive reviews, but also realize for \$5 maybe it's worth the risk for something interesting
- Not everything is \$5 they start at \$5, but can be more depending on complexity, changes, etc. and some have options that you can select when purchasing (such as the HD upgrade for the video intro for an extra \$5 that I purchased
- Many of the bidders are international –be sure to give EXACT text for any project as errors in your text are unlikely to be caught and you will likely be charged for changes

I like this comic maker because of its customizability – you can import your own pictures as well as use those that are pre-made.

Finally, on a side note, Chris Lysy cartoons about evaluation at FreshSpectrum http://freshspectrum.com/ - he has talent regarding illustrating that I do not. FreshSpectrum is good for a laugh, for a conversation starter, and for inspiration.



From the Pantheon!

Tool: Tableau Public

Use: Suite of data visualization tools

Cost: \$0

Downside – to use Tableau Public your data set must be made public – regular Tableau is approximately \$1000/seat but with discounts available to education and nonprofits

Tableau Public is difficult to cover in a rapid fire session, it takes a bit of time to demonstrate even a few of its tools – it would be a bit like covering SPSS in 5 minutes. However, Tableau has a range of great online tutorials

One of my favorite downtime podcasts is filmspotting (see http://filmspotting.net/) – they offer erudite evaluations (ok reviews) of films old and new. Each week they offer a top five list on some film-related topic, ranging from 'top 5 cinema spies' to 'top 5 Woody Allen scenes.' They also have a pantheon (see http://filmspotting.net/top-5/pantheon.html) – a set of movies ineligible for their top five lists because they are so beloved by the hosts that the films woud re-appear over and over. Such is Tableau for me, definitely in my pantheon –





Use: Create a very limited number of near-instant infographics based on social media metrics and explore a wide range of data visualizations and infographics for inspiration – also includes a marketplace in beta release where you can find a designer for an infographics project

Visual.ly currently has seven default infographics that you can make in a matter of two minutes or fewer – over half are sponsored by corporate brands such as Amstel Light, but the Twitter hashtag example, the twitter showdown (comparing two twitter users example), and facebook insights example are all relatively generic and sponsored by visual.ly itself. Major downsides include that you cannot delve deeper into the data within visual.ly (although other applications let you do so), so it is indeed a snapshot and you have to accept what is given.



Tool: Microsoft Photosynth

Use: Stitch together photos into a panorama (multiple stitched together photos from a single spot that can create a 360 look) or a synth (multiple photos of a single item taken from different vantage points)
